For children that do not have a statement of special educational needs or who have not been able to access an ICT SEN Assessment.

The Challenge

The ICT Service has provided ICT SEN Assessments for over 10 years and is well regarded for providing personalised and professional advice for children with a wide spectrum of special educational needs and disabilities in mainstream schools.

We carry out all assessments on behalf of the Cambridgeshire County Council STAR Team (Statutory Assessment and Resources Team) and further information on this service can be found on our website www.theictservice.org.uk

Schools are recognising the benefits of using technology to support learning and promote independence for children with special educational needs.

In response to demand from schools we are now offering a scaled down version of this service for children who do not have a statement or who have not been successful in obtaining an assessment funded by Cambridgeshire County Council. If you have pupils that you believe would benefit from using technology to support their learning, but are unsure of what is possible, then please contact us.

Technology can support children with a variety of difficulties including the following:

- Fine and gross motor issues
- Dyslexia
- Autistic Spectrum including Asperger's Syndrome
- Physical Disabilities
- Dyspraxia

Schools are funding assessments and equipment through a variety of means including pupil premium, parental contribution through money already provided for support. We offer:
